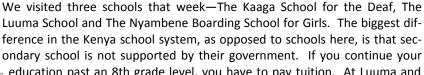

Meru was only five kilometers north of the equator, so after piling back into the van, it was a very short trip to The Blue Towers Hotel. We stayed at the Blue Towers for the week. It was a nice place to stay.

The health screenings were held at the churches in which the pastor trainings were. The days that we ran the screenings were extremely busy. We seemed to find most of the people in the communities to have

good blood pressures and blood sugars, and those who had readings out of the normal range had already been to visit the clinics and doctors.



There were so many moments of this trip that made it absolutely unforgettable. We saw a beautiful waterfall. The Monarch Tree, which is the oldest tree in east Africa. It is so big that you can actually crawl inside of the tree. We only had five of us inside the tree, but there was plenty of room for more! One of the most memorable things was probably going on safari. To see lions and giraffes and monkeys and elephants and zebras and so much more—all so close you could almost reach out and touch them—was amazing.

Did You Know?



The Just Born factory, in Bethlehem, PA, produces enough PEEPS® Brand Marshmallow Candies in one year to circle the Earth twice. In the early

1950s, it took 27 hours to make one PEEPS® chick. Today it takes 6 minutes.

The most famous decorated Easter eggs were those made by the well-known goldsmith, Peter Carl Fabergé. In 1883 Fabergé was commissioned by the Russian Czar, Alexander, to make a special Easter gift for his wife, the Empress Marie. Fabergé's first egg had an outside shell of platinum and enameled white which opened





to reveal a smaller gold egg. The smaller egg, in turn, opened to display a golden chicken and a jeweled replica of the Imperial crown.



The Easter lily (or Bermuda lily) was first brought to the United States in 1919 by a World War I soldier named Louis Houghton, who brought the bulbs to Oregon and gave them to friends and fam-

ily. Today, an area along the California and Oregon border produces 95 percent of all bulbs grown in the world for the potted Easter lily market. They produce more than 11 million bulbs annually.

Give Your Back a Break

Try these strategies to prevent painful injuries.

If your job requires sitting for long periods of time:

- Sit up straight with your feet flat on the floor and your knees bent at a 90-degree angle. If you're short, use a stool for your feet.
- Keep your lower back flat against a firm backrest. A lumbar support pillow may give added comfort.
- When reaching to the side, turn your whole body rather than twisting part of it.
- Arrange your work area to avoid repeated bending and reaching.
- During scheduled breaks, get up and walk around. Gentle stretching can also help relieve tense back and neck muscles.

If your job requires standing for long periods of time:

- Place one foot on a small stool or box and then alternate feet from time to time.
- Stand up straight and keep your head aligned with your back and hips.
- Avoid bending and twisting the trunk area at the same time. Turn your whole body as a unit.
- Shift position frequently. Stretch gently to loosen up the muscles in your back.

Many of the causes of back pain at work result from improperly lifting heavy items. Here are some basic techniques for lifting safely:

- Assess if you need help. Before you even think of lifting an object, ask yourself
 if you can handle the load alone or whether you should solicit the help of a coworker or some kind of mechanical aid, like a dolly.
- Always bend your knees. Most people bend at their waist when they try to lift something. But that strains your back. Bending at the knees helps you keep your center of gravity and lets your stronger leg muscles do the work of lifting.
- **Hug the load.** Keep the object as close to your body as you can while you gradually straighten your legs to a standing position.
- **Don't twist.** Keep your feet, knees, and torso pointed in the same direction when you lift. Twisting can overload your spine and cause serious injury.
- Carefully put down the load. Use the same techniques in lifting as in setting down the object.
