Seven US presidents have changed their names legally. Ulysses Simpson Grant (pictured) changed from Hiram Ulysses Grant. Grover Cleveland changed from Stephen Grover Cleveland. Woodrow Wilson changed from Thomas Woodrow Wilson. Calvin Coolidge changed from John Calvin Coolidge. Dwight David Eisenhower changed from David Dwight Eisenhower. Gerald Rudolph

Ford changed from Leslie King, Jr. (changed when his mother remarried and his stepfather legally adopted him). William Jefferson Clinton changed from William Jefferson Blythe (changed when his mother remarried and his stepfather legally adopted him).

There were actually SEVEN presidents before George They are known to history as the Washington. "Presidents under the Articles of Confederation" and had the official title of "President of the United States in Congress Assembled." The first was John Hanson (1781-82), and the next six presidents were Elias Boudinot (1783), Thomas Mifflin (1784), Richard Henry Lee (1785), Nathan



Gorman (1786), Arthur St. Clair (1787), and Cyrus Griffin (1788). There were actually sixteen Presidents of the Continental Congress, but John Hanson, the ninth, was the first to serve as President under the Articles of Confederation and the first to hold the title "President of the United States.'

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The Famous Stomach

On June 6, 1822, in the company store of the American Fur Company on Mackinac Island in Lake Huron, a drunken man accidentally discharged his rifle into the torso of Alexis St. Martin, a 28-year-old voyageur who worked for the American Fur Company. A voyageur is a traveling porter and canoe-man, whose job it was to row the big cargo canoes along rivers, and to carry both the vessel and its cargo along the banks when a waterfall or rapids got in the way. Voyageurs worked in teams.



Dr. William Beaumont (left), an army surgeon, was stationed on Mackinac Island in Lake Huron as part of a peacekeeping force in 1822. Beaumont rushed to the young man's side to find a massive hole where his belly button had been. Part of the stomach was actually spilling out. Expecting the man to die, Beaumont cleaned the wound and applied a dressing.

Here is a description of the injury that Beaumont himself wrote a dozen years later:

"The wound was received just under the left breast, and supposed, at the time, to have been mortal. A large portion of the side was blown off, the ribs fractured and openings made into the cavities of the chest and abdomen, through which protruded portions of the lungs and stomach, much lacerated and burnt, exhibiting altogether an appalling and hopeless case. The diaphragm was lacerated and a perforation made directly into the cavity of the stomach, through which breakfast food was escaping [when Beaumont arrived at the scene]."

Alexis St. Martin did not die. Instead his stomach healed in a very strange way—the stomach attached itself to the wall of his chest while the hole remained open with a loose flap of lining hanging over it like a curtain—it became a permanent gastric fistula. By pushing the flap aside people could actually see inside the man's stomach!

Dr. Beaumont immediately recognized the opportunity this presented. He could be the first man to study and examine a living digestive system. Convincing St. Martin to cooperate, Beaumont began experimenting by tying tiny bits of food on silk threads and inserting them in St. Martin's stomach. Periodically he would remove them to observe the state of digestion.

St. Martin became an employee of Dr. Beaumont doing various chores, such as chopping wood, working as a house servant, and mowing the fields. He had to keep a dressing over the hole when he worked or his last meal would spill out.

After the first year of experiments, St. Martin skipped out and returned to his home in Berthier, Canada. He married Marie Joy and together they would have 6 children. He took up his old profession with another fur company and remained in Canada for 4 years. Dr. Beaumont traced him through agents from his previous employer and hired St. Martin for work in Fort Crawford in Wisconsin. The agents transported St. Martin and his family to the fort, which was about 2,000 miles away by boat—a very rugged trip in those days. Once at the fort, Dr. Beaumont started a second series of experiments under the old arrangements, with St. Martin working as a general servant and a guinea pig. The doctor and his "guinea pig" parted ways once again but eventually got back together for a third series of experiments.

Dr. Beaumont's experiments led to a new branch of science—the study of human digestion—and made celebrities of both Beaumont and St. Martin (whose tummy window stayed open for the rest of his life). In 1833, Beaumont published his book, *Experiments and Observations on the Gastric Juice and the Physiology of Digestion*. The book contains some 240 experiments, all performed in the same famous stomach.



Dr. Beaumont died in 1853, at the age of 68, partly as a result of a slip on ice-covered steps. Alexis St. Martin, the man with the hole in his stomach, died in 1880, living to the age of 86. The photo on the left is Alexis St. Martin at age 81.
