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Free Coffee Day!



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Pneumonia

We often talk about pneumonia as if it was little more than a very bad flu. We might take it more seriously if we realized that it kills more than three million people every year, including nearly 100,000 people in the United States—more than double the amount of deaths from all highway accidents.

HOW IT KILLS

Pneumonia is an inflammation of the lungs, which can be caused by a number of things including chemicals, parasites, viruses, and fungi. So unlike the flu, it is not just caused by one type of invader. Bacterial pneumonia is the most lethal, and you are most likely to get it by breathing in water droplets infected by someone who already has pneumonia.

Once you've inhaled the bacteria (or some other type of lung assassin), it travels down to your lungs where it assaults your alveoli, the tiny air sacs in your lungs. They fill up with fluid and mucous, cutting off the transfer of oxygen and your ability to breath normally. Here's a list of other possible symptoms:

- Coughing up "colorful" mucous—green, yellow, brown and red
- Chest pains from coughing and internal infection
- Chills and high fever
- Vomiting and nausea
- Muscle pain and fatigue

- Diarrhea
- Profuse sweating
- Lips and other areas of skin turning blue
- Disoriented (light headed)

Ironically, people in high-risk groups, such as older adults and people with chronic illnesses or weakened immune systems, may have fewer or milder symptoms than less vulnerable people do. And instead of having the high fever that often characterizes pneumonia, older adults may even have a lower than normal temperature.

After infection, symptoms show up anytime from one to seven days later. Death can occur anytime from two to eight weeks. (Twenty to fifty percent depending on age and country.)

Respiratory failure is the medical cause of death but pneumonia itself is often listed as the cause on many death certificates.

One sad fact about pneumonia is that the vast majority of fatalities are children.

PERSONAL METHODS TO AVOID PNEUMONIA

(Some forms of bacterial pneumonia can be prevented with a pneumococcal vaccine. The vaccine does not protect against most types of viral pneumonia or the pneumonia that people with low immunity tend to develop. Consult your doctor about your need for a vaccine.)

- Like any other respiratory infection, good hygiene such as washing your hands regularly with soap and water and avoiding contact with people who are infected are the basics to preventing pneumonia.
- The healthier you are, the more protected you are from pneumonia. So, eat a
 healthy diet rich in antioxidants, such as fresh dark-colored fruits and vegetables
 and other nutrients.
- Drink plenty of fluids (water, fresh juice, herbal tea, etc.)
- Strengthen your cardiovascular system! Include aerobic exercises, such as a brisk walk, as a regular part of your lifestyle.
- Avoiding aspiration pneumonia (breathing in chemicals) is simple. Read and follow ALL safety directions on the labels (or MSDS) of any chemicals you use.

NOTABLE VICTIMS

Pneumonia has taken more than its share of famous victims, including Franz Liszt, William Henry Harrison, Fred Astaire, Charles Bronson, and James Brown. Muppet creator and *Sesame Street* icon Jim Henson became a famous victim of pneumonia when he died suddenly on May 16, 1990. Henson thought he had a cold he couldn't shake and after it worsened he finally checked himself into a New York hospital. He died within twenty-four hours after being admitted.

A lesson for the rest of us—if you have a persistent cold/cough lasting for more than a week or any other serious symptoms that could indicate pneumonia, don't delay in getting professional medical care.

TWO GRIM FACTS

- 1. Prior to 1936, pneumonia was the leading cause of death in the United States and has remained in the top ten ever since.
- 2. Pneumonia kills more children worldwide than any other disease.
